FCCO BOARD OF DIRECTORS ISSUES A PUBLIC DECLARATION ON NEW QUEBEC GOVERNMENT'S ECONOMIC MEASURES

In conjunction with the 2012 convention, the FCCQ board of directors adopted a special declaration addressed to the new Quebec government on concerns expressed by the business community over some of the initial economic measures announced by the Minister of Finance.

The FCCQ urged the government to work more closely with the business community and take advantage of every opportunity to create wealth for the benefit of Quebec as a whole and its regions, with due regard for the economy, the environment and social needs - the three key components of sustainable development.

The FCCQ has recently welcomed the government's subsequent amendment of the new taxation provisions on healthcare deductions, capital gains and dividends.

As an extra-special wrapup to our annual gathering, the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Montreal, this year's official convention host, presented the show Radio, a swinging trip through several generations of popular music, from classic 1950s Rock and Roll to the Twist and Yeah-Yeah-Yeahs of the early1960s, followed by trendsetters from the 1980s and 1990s, and ending with some of the awesome hits on the current music scene.

YOUNG PEOPLE ARE DIGITAL ACTIVISTS



Today's young people are true digital activists according to Rebecca Ryan, a well-known entrepreneur and expert on workforce strategies.

At the main plenary session, where she appeared as the featured guest speaker, Ryan told her audience that living in a media-saturated environment and being in nonstop communications with their peers has numerous repercussions on the way young people work.

Today's Millennials are very different from their parents says Ryan, and in order to attract and retain them as workers, companies must offer a "cool" environment, including the ability to control their own time, managers who pay attention to them and show appreciation, possibilities for self-improvement and opportunities for advancement. Without these, tomorrow's future leaders will go elsewhere to put their talents to work.

This conference was followed by a plenary session on the same topic led by columnist and political analyst Éric Duhaime. Also taking part were UMQ president Éric Forest, mayor of Rimouski, Marie-Claude Elie, senior accounts manager at Google Quebec and Louis J. Duhamel, consulting partner for strategic guidance, governance and international development at Deloitte.



PENSION PLANS: A MAJOR CHALLENGE

Spreading the pension fund burden evenly between our businesses and governments is a major challenge that must be addressed if we are to ensure economic growth and maintain a sound fiscal policy as well.



At a working lunch, Alain Dubuc, journalist and columnist for La Presse, and lawyer Paul St-Pierre Plamondon, president of Génération d'idées, discussed the issue of sustainable company pension plans and the burden that will fall to younger workers when Baby Boomers

During the workshop entitled "Pension plans: A new model is necessary," which followed the working lunch, it was shown that reform is not only desirable but imperative. In no way, however, should it

compromise a company's financial stability, and municipal governments must take action based on realistic forecasts that would not impose additional burdens on taxpayers.



LOCAL AND JUNIOR CHAMBERS: TALK TO EACH OTHER!



The workshop entitled "Junior and local chambers: What collaboration?" dealt with the differing models for business groups at the local level.

Should the presence of a junior chamber of commerce be a priority? Or should a senior chamber establish a youth wing internally? Workshop participants concluded that both models can be effective. What's most important is that the chosen model should respect local dynamics and that solid communications channels should be created between "juniors" and "seniors."

SUCCESSFUL ENTREPRENEURS COMBINE COURAGE AND PRIDE

Our future depends on the work of the young people who will become tomorrow's business leaders, according to Quebecor president and CEO Pierre Karl Péladeau, who shared his thoughts with us at the convention's final plenary session. In a fascinating and humorous speech on aspects of his own career in business and the succession question in the family, Péladeau noted that courage and pride are crucial ingredients in every true entrepreneur's success story.
