business owners this year, beginning with our annual convention, which explored intergenerational dynamics the business community and in a business succession context. In conjunction with a number of prominent partners, we launched the Prêt à entreprendre program on a Ouébec-wide basis to support new entrepreneurs.



HELPING QUÉBEC MOVE FORWARD

he FCCQ is the voice of the Québec business community, a driver of change that informs public debate and takes strong positions on a number of key issues related to economic development. In its capacity as a representative of Québec's employers and an advocate for the province's chambers of commerce, the FCCQ champions important economic matters through private meetings with government officials and various consultations and parliamentary committees. Here are two examples:

ENCOURAGE THE GOVERNMENT TO BE A **FACILITATOR OF ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT**

The FCCQ helped stop the provincial government from retroactively taxing capital gains and dividends and rescinding the health tax.

As an offshoot of its 2012 annual convention, the FCCO formed a coalition made up of members of its Board of Directors. businesspeople from more than 25 different sectors and representatives of some 30 chambers of commerce to issue a special declaration to Québec's newly elected government. By mounting a strong common front of likeminded representatives of the business community, the FCCQ played an important role in getting the government to back down from retroactively taxing capital gains and dividends and rescinding the health tax.

On multiple occasions during the past year, the FCCQ actively encouraged the government to partner with businesses and become a catalyst for economic development. This involved a wide range of initiatives, from issuing a position on Bill 1 on the integrity of public contracts to engaging in consultations related to the provincial and federal pre-budget process, the future of the Québec pension plan system, legislation on the creation of an economic development bank in Québec and the proposed social economy act (Bill 27).

DEVELOP NATURAL RESOURCE SECTORS: A PRIORITY

The FCCQ set up meetings with members of five of its sector committees (Mines, Energy, Northern Development, Sustainability and Infrastructure, and Transportation and Logistics) to discuss essential concerns related to natural resources. FCCQ executives also travelled to Val-d'Or, Sept-Îles, Bécancour, Thetford Mines, Saguenay, the Gaspé Peninsula, Québec City and Montréal to touch base with local businesses, get a feel for the investment climate and engage in a dialogue with elected municipal officials, government representatives

The FCCQ also repeatedly stressed the importance of maintaining the status quo in terms of mining industry taxes and jointly orchestrated, with Secor-KPMG and Fasken Martineau, Québec's first mining industry forum, which enabled key stakeholders to share their concerns and clarify their priorities.

Moreover, the FCCQ adopted a position on numerous issues associated with the development of natural resources and energy-related matters in the province, defending the need to embrace sustainable projects that are mindful of the environment, the community and economic development. It spoke out in favour of building pipelines to move oil from western Canada to Québec, exploration and development of hydrocarbon and shale gas resources in the province, maintaining the Gentilly 2 nuclear generating station and uranium mining, and moving forward with mini hydroelectric power plant projects.

A number of concrete efforts were also undertaken in 2012-2013 to:

- emphasize the importance of revitalizing Northern development
- ensure that the CSST utilizes effective approaches to workplace health and safety that take the reality and financial capacity of Québec businesses into account
- stress the role that the private sector needs to play in our healthcare system
- > strengthen our entrepreneurial culture to ensure strong future generations of business owners
- maintain Québec's competitive edge in the pharmaceutical
- improve the university funding system

- encourage the use of incentives, not coercive measures, to support Québec products
- adopt sustainability practices without hindering economic
- foster the emergence of a green building industry
- uphold public-private partnerships as an effective public infrastructure financing solution
- safeguard the consulting engineering industry in Québec—one of the cornerstones of our economy
- fight against excessive regulation, an overly simplistic and inefficient response to complex problems
- draw attention to the importance of revamping our pension plans.



2013 MERCURIADES AWARDS: 33rd edition of Québec's most prestigious business

The Mercuriades Awards were launched by the FCCQ in 1981 to shine the spotlight on the entrepreneurial drive, success and ambition of Québec businesses. Some 800 members of the business community attended the colourful and spirited gala event, where 19 Québec businesses were celebrated for their commitment to excellence, innovation and bold spirit. The 2013 Businesses of the Year were Groupe C. Laganière (SMB) and Olymel (large business).

2012 ANNUAL CONVENTION: Towards a new intergenerational contract

FCCQ's 2012 annual convention took place in Montréal. Among those in attendance were business executives and chamber of commerce representatives. The day-long line-up of talks and workshops provided participants with an opportunity to explore various facets of intergenerational dynamics, business transfer and pension plans, with a number of esteemed guest speakers such as Rebecca Ryan, a well-known entrepreneur and expert in labour strategies, La Presse reporter and columnist Alain Dubuc and Pierre Karl Péladeau. During the convention, the Chambre de commerce et d'industrie de Laval was named Chamber of Commerce of the Year.

RENDEZ-VOUS EVENTS: Private meetings with influential leaders

In recent months, FCCO members interested in the political and economic landscape in Ouébec had the chance to discuss current issues with important political figures, including Élaine Zakaïb, Minister for Industrial Policy and the Banque de développement économique du Québec; Jean-François Lisée, Minister of International Relations, La Francophonie and External Trade; and Tom Mulcair, head of the federal New Democratic Party and Leader of the Official Opposition.

Similarly, Rendez-vous Affaires events provided an opportunity to connect with such highly regarded business leaders as Luc Meunier, Chief Executive Officer of Infrastructure Québec; Gilles Paquin, President and CEO of Revenu Québec; Sophie Brochu, President and Chief Executive Officer of Gaz Métro; Julie Pottier, Regional Vice-President, Québec Region, Export Development Canada; Zoë Yujnovich, President and Chief Executive Officer of Iron Ore; and Marc Laliberté, President and Chief Executive Officer of VIA Rail Canada.
